




Happy Staff Appreciation Week!


Animal watching News: The birds have discovered where we keep the birdseed, and our Hummingbirds have learned the importance of fully closing a lid after filling the birdfeeder. This










Preparing for the Great Smoky Mountains

In the Wing community, we have spent a couple of weeks preparing for our end-of-year trip to the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. We will be spending three nights and four days in the region experiencing the mountain wilderness as well as some sights and sounds in the Gatlinburg/Pigeon Forge area. We will experience the *Dolly Parton's Stampede* dinner theatre and the chance to ride a mountain coaster. Our two full days in the region will focus on the two main people groups who have settled the region, the Cherokee people (Cherokee, NC) and the white American settlers of Cade's Cove (TN).

Our government class has focused over the past two weeks on learning about these two groups of people, how they lived, their culture and traditions, and what led to the Eastern Band Cherokee Nation having a sovereign nation within the United States. We have also looked at the process that led to our government setting aside lands as National Parks.

In anticipation of our trip and with the arrival of warmer weather we have been taking more hikes to get our mountain legs prepared. Mad River Gorge is beautiful this time of year and our students loved doing a bit of rock climbing and exploring in the area. Recent hikes have also included Clifton Gorge and the northwest area of Buck Creek State Park. We were able to end our series of Spring Friday activities with our traditional bike ride to Urbana and back to school. We stopped at the Depot Coffeehouse for lunch and a raucous Connect Four tournament where Jeremy Begel was crowned champion.
