#### Board Member Meg Thompson and sons to spend the school year in Madagascar

After learning the Nightingale Montessori philosophy and Sound Shapes reading program from Nancy and Sheila from 1996-2011, and honing those skills at Heron Berry Hill Farm School from 2012-2021, Meg is launching her international career and bringing those learning opportunities to an area of the world where they are much needed. While Malagasy is the native language of Madagascar, much formal education occurs in French leaving a deficit of materials for teaching early reading in Malagasy. Meg has been working virtually with Sekoly Kintana, demonstrating the Sound Shapes program for use with English speaking children and applying its principles designed and articulated by Nancy to develop materials for learning Malagasy and French. It's now time to continue this work in person and add two students, Collin and Sean, who are lifelong Montessori

learners, as models of self motivation for the other students. Meg will be forever grateful for what she has learned from her mentors and vows to be a mentor for Montessori programs in as many diverse locations as possible.

They have been working on their sorting skills by placing seeds with their respective outcome. The children are starting to understand where foods originate from and how they are cultivated. Kaylee and Jared have also worked with the children to plant pumpkins and other produce in the garden beds on the Eagle playground. Dr. Maria Montessori said, "Nature has this beautiful arrangement in which everybody, while striving for his own life and happiness, does something for the improvement and conservation of the environment." The children help nurture the plants by watering them and preparing the beds with the compost we generate at the school. The Wing students have also worked with the Eagles on the gardening projects. The children have been generating much less trash in the classroom by being mindful about the foods they bring to school to eat for lunch. Falcons demonstrate our commitment to the community through jobs, mentoring, and individual skills. We practiced being a community this week with team building games.





#### Respect for Life

In our class, we've been observing the incredible life cycle of the monarch butterfly right outside our door. The milkweed in our garden has become home to many hungry monarch caterpillars, and now we're beginning to see some forming their chrysalides. Watching this transformation up close is a reminder of how learning happens best when it's connected to the natural world. As Maria Montessori once said, "The land is where our roots are. The children must be taught to feel and live in harmony with the Earth." By caring for the milkweed and observing the caterpillars, we're not only learning science, but also practicing patience, curiosity, and respect for life.

Wings apply maximum effort to create the tallest tower, utilizing resources around the building, including a ladder!

#### **American History Unit**

American History is kicking off with a unit on Tecumseh, Simon Kenton, and life in the Ohio Valley during the late 18th and early 19th centuries. The goal of the unit is for students to understand the complexities of the interactions between the local Shawnee people and the American settlers of European descent. The unit begins with the introduction of Tecumseh and Simon Kenton as representatives of these two groups, inspired by the style of the historical narrative, The Frontiersmen by Allan Eckert. The Wings will end August by spending a day at the Fair At New Boston to experience reenactments and culture from this time period. George Rogers Clark, the namesake of our county, led an attack on the Shawnee village of Pekowi (multiple spellings) in 1790, which is the presentday site of George Rogers Clark Park and the Fair at New Boston. Students will gather information, analyze causes and effects of these events, research a chosen person from the period, and develop a thesis about this complicated portion of the history of the land on which we now attend school. We will end the unit with a trip to the newly opened Great Council State Park in Xenia, which is on the site of the important Shawnee village, Old Chilicothee, the likely birthplace of Tecumseh.

Wing Independent Curriculum

This is the first full year we are implementing our independent Montessori Secondary Curriculum with the Wing students. While there are dozens of exemplary models for primary and elementary Montessori education, finding examples of Montessori ideals being successfully implemented with middle and high school age students is rarer. Andrew and Sarah, with the help of Jared, Jayne, and Maria, are experimenting this year by creating as much "shelf work" and open work time as possible. This will allow student choice in topics as well as their day-to-day schedule. A variety of books on each topic are available to students to help them craft assignments that interest them. This independence is a bit of an adjustment for some students, but is part of our long-term goal as an adolescent Montessori classroom to guide students through "valorization." Valorization is a process named by Maria Montessori to describe how a young person grows into adulthood with confidence, strength, resilience and capability.

#### **Nature Journaling**

The Wing Program is instituting a new requirement of nature journaling as a part of our Erdkinder curriculum. Each student spends time in nature, making observations and including words, numbers, and sketches to help develop skills in mindfulness and careful observation while soaking up the mental and physical health benefits of our forested campus. Nature journaling can seem off-putting to students who feel that "they can't draw," but it is an opportunity for training in a growth mindset to realize that they can learn to draw and make observations with more and more skill as they practice it each week.
