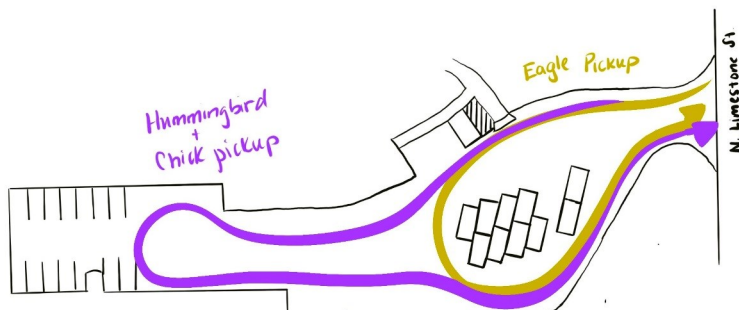

Extensive support our sustainable living school:

There are extensive challenges for the preparation of the environment of a school that is offering students woods and garden experiences. A deer fence was built around a large vegetable garden to help keep resident woodland animals from eating all our harvest. A number of dying trees and limbs were cut down to eliminate safety hazards. With heavy equipment for full three days, buckthorn and honey suckle roots and branches were removed on the sunny side of the southern parking lot in preparation for a prairie and butterfly garden. The old Oak trees in the lot were "elevated" to increase their health. With great effort to save the treasured redwoods, more honeysuckle and buckthorn were cut out along the entire frontage of NM for a state of the art solar fence to be erected soon. A grove of non-native trees were felled to make space for a large wooden Nightingale Montessori sign at the south entrance. Trees were elevated in the toddler play space to make room for a solar drive through tunnel planned for an access way to the home of the Chickadees and south west parking . We want to thank **Coleman Tree Services** for their extraordinary competent work and charitable billing.

- We installed an Amish made bicycle shed for the older group to store their bikes for trips along the bike path to Urbana.
- We began repair on the upperclass brick tool shed, temporarily held up due to worker injury.
- We installed an Amish garden shed for the Chickadee planting and for an abundance of seasonal activity equipment. This left room in the house shed for everyday outdoor work shelves.
- We bought a small Amish made chicken coop to aide in the fun for Chickadees in our school egg production.

Needed Capital Improvements

We were finally able to repair the upstairs roof from tornado damage sustained a couple of years ago. Two new hot water heaters were installed and one commercial refrigerator repaired. The



space for an art room and a new tool shed are both in mid-way of extensive development. An innovative solar frontal fence, a solar array, plus a large wooden NIGHTINGALE MONTESSORI sign are all currently in their fabrication phase after several design iterations. The whole south parking lot is midway in its course of renovation . It awaits the completion of heavy equipment required to install the solar array before it will be resurfaced. Next will come new striping for parking zones and directional indicators for turn arounds.



Preparations for our Grand Open House with Alumni Social and Sustainable Living Workshop

We wanted to have our event this fall and began getting ready last Spring. However, the challenges were too big for too few assigned. The hardest step is always the first and that has been accomplished. We have lists of alumni invitees culled from 45 years of alumni lists which have no email addresses for those attending back in the day! We have lists of many invitees who have been contributors and supporters including devoted contractors who have helped so much along our entrepreneurial way. We even have lists of people who we believe would be fascinated and enticed into being invested if only they could see our amazing accomplishment. We began distributing our brochures and updating marketing materials. A marketing guru, whose son is a student at NM, has volunteered. A local artist has posthumously offered his entire collection of photographs, which until recently were sold in national galleries. These would be offered to donors in appreciation for their recognition of our value in reinventing education. We received a promise of all the desserts and hors d'oeuvres we need for our celebratory event. We are extremely appreciative of an extravagant proposal from Cy-clotherapy to provide top grade bikes at cut rate prices to platform our student biking program. We want to fundraise immediately to take advantage of this generosity! With the first step well planted, we encourage others to join us to plan all the agenda pieces that would showcase our invincible spirit that kindles the vital spark that would ignite the aspiration of a re- invention of education.

Students stopped and visited like Dominic P. and Jace R. the whole family in tow. 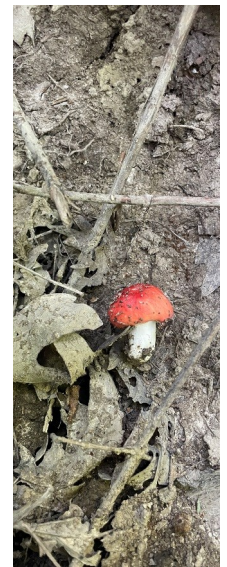

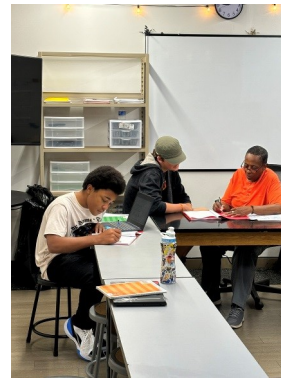
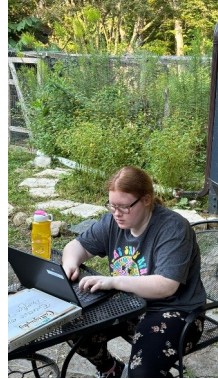
